Do you know the names of the elements of their symbols?. Todd Helmenstine's crossword puzzles are not only fun, but can be a good way to practice spelling unknown words, such as the names of periodic table items. The clues for this printable crossword puzzle are the symbols of the first several elements. A response key for the crossword puzzle is provided on the next page. A track will always be written in the same part of speech as the answer. Check tracks that require answers that end in S, ED, EST, or ING. Often, these endings can be written in pencil (but not always). Checking the crosses of these responses can help verify whether the end is applied. For example, if the cross and bottom track is plural for two responses that intersect in the last letter, the letter is most likely 'S'. Foreign words will be marked directly, Friend: Fr. - AMI or indirectly, Friend, in France. Abbreviated responses are indicated directly, Whistlestop (Abbr.) - STA or indirectly with an abbreviated word as part of the track, RR stop - STA. These regulatory conventions are the accepted standard for American-style puzzles. Crossword puzzles are a traditional part of many daily newspapers. Since 1913, when Arthur Wynne published the first crossword puzzle in New York World, puzzles around the world have reveled in these head scratching games [source: Brief History of Crossword puzzles]. And there's more to crossword puzzles than fun; some studies have shown that regular solving puzzles like crossword puzzles or Sudoku can help improve your memory, and may even reduce mental decline in the elderly [source: Christie]. Crossword puzzles are also a great way to improve your vocabulary and general knowledge. Some crossword puzzles are simple, but some definitely aren't. The famous New York Times Sunday crossword puzzle is one of the toughest there is, and it's not for the faint of heart. But don't despair, there are a lot of tricks out there that can help you become a puzzle master. Remember, the harder the puzzle, the more satisfying it is when you fill in that final square. Announcement Ready to dive? Read on for top 10 crossword tips. Content Crossword puzzles are a bit like cobwebs; each answer is connected to the others nearby to form a woven network of letters. Pulling a string of letters also affects all others. Most crossword puzzles are naturally divided into several groups of tracks up and down, connected to the other groups by longer responses. With that in mind, working through the puzzle one group of columns at a time -- rather than going through all the clues at once, followed by all the downward tracks -- is a good strategy. Each you fill in will help solve the others around you. Announcement Sometimes crossword craftsmen will rely on other languages for their answers. But how are you supposed to know if the answer is in English or something else? You'll have to trust clue to tell you. If the wording of the track refers to a specific city or country, or if part of the track is in a foreign language, that is a pretty sure indicator that your answer should be in that same language [source: Sayles]. Few crossword enthusiasts are actually fluent in the languages most often found on the tracks, but a basic knowledge of articles, verbs and personal titles in some of the most common languages will be a long way. French, Spanish, German and Latin are particularly popular with puzzle craftsmen. Advertising A popular strategy for taking tests is to go through all the questions and skip the ones you don't know. And while they're not multiple-choice, you can do the same with crossword puzzles -- fortunately, without being rated in the end. Don't spend too much time scratching your hair on a track you can't break. Move on to the easiest ones, because that strategy comes with a bonus: filling in the answers you know will provide you with letters for those you don't. This significantly reduces the chances, especially for tracks where more than one response could be applied. Announcement Are you stuck with a half-finished puzzle and a spinning head? Don't let it stress you out, crossword puzzles are meant to be challenging, but they're also supposed to be fun. It's perfectly fine just to walk away for a while. Unless you're competing in the American Crossword Puzzle Tournament, there's no time limit, so don't go crazy trying to finish the puzzle at your lunch hour. Sometimes the best thing you can do is take a break and clear your mind. Come back later, and you might be surprised at what's jumping towards you. Announcement Happens to all of us. If you look at a word long enough, it suddenly looks bad, even if it's a word you've been spelling properly since high school. So it wouldn't be very strange to discover a misspelling between your answers, would it? Putting an E before an I instead of the other way around can throw the other clues into that particular section of the puzzle. There will also be times when the answers originally come from a language such as Arabic or Russian, whose alphabets are completely different from the Latin alphabet used by most Western countries. As a result, there are often a number of accepted spellings for these translated words. In such cases, the track will usually include a var in parentheses to indicate that there is more than one established way to spell the word in question. Announcement Is there a puzzle track that gives you additional problems? Do you have a question mark at the end? In the world of crossword puzzles, a clue with a question mark means that a particular clue demands a second look. Typically, that little punctuation is an indication that itself is a word game, rather than a direct question that demands an answer or a blank fill [source: Sayles]. Therefore, the most obvious answer is probably not the right one. Think of everything meanings of the track; you can always ruminate on it while going to other parts of the puzzle. Announcement Many crossword puzzles have a title that provides a certain view of the puzzle theme. And whether or not the puzzle has a title, it will almost always have a theme. Throughout the puzzle, the author will disperse the answers that are tied back into the subject. Those answers are usually longer and will contain more than one word. Often, the tracks will be a game on the subject, so the connection might not be immediately obvious. Still, considering the theme or title as you progress through the tracks might provide some information to guide you in the right direction. Announcement Let's call a shovel a shovel. But does that mean we're calling the shovel a shovel - or a card suit? Some words have not only one or two meanings, but several. If part of the puzzle isn't coming together, and one of the clues might have more than one answer, try them all. In particular, be aware of words with multiple meanings in the question mark clues mentioned above. Puzzle composers and editors are a sneaky group; they will use multiple meanings to

throw aspiring solvers out of the scent. Thinking outside the box, both literally and figuratively, will help you finish the job. Announcement Are you giving a lot of answers, or maybe you're just stabbing in the dark? There will always be times when you think you know what the answer is, but you can't be 100 percent sure. Do you take a chance and write in your guess, don't you? If the answer in question intersects with another maybe-it-is-maybe-she-is not a clue, skip it for the time being. Writing in the wrong answers can deflect you, especially if you're one of the brave souls who prefer to make the puzzle in the pen. Instead, rely on the answers you know are right to take you back to safe territory. Announcement There is absolutely no shame in relying on a reference book. Some of the main benefits of crossword puzzles are expanding their own knowledge and vocabulary. If you've solved all the clues in a cluster, but one of the resulting answers isn't a term you're familiar with, take your trusty Oxford English Dictionary off the shelf. You'll find that the word is correct and add something new to your phraseology, or you'll find that some of your answers need to be rethought. Other reference books, such as a thesaurus or encyclopedia, are equally useful. After all, if you knew every crossword response without even trying, it wouldn't be so much fun -- and you wouldn't have a new nugget of curiosities for bandy at cocktail parties.
